THIRD QUARTER ENDED MARCH 31, 2012

This Management Discussion and Analysis ("MD&A") is a review of the results of operations, the liquidity and the capital resources of Orbit Garant Drilling Inc. This discussion contains forward-looking statements. Please see "Forward-Looking Statements" for a discussion of the risks, uncertainties and assumptions relating to these statements.

This MD&A should be read in conjunction with the comparative unaudited interim condensed consolidated financial statements for the three and nine month periods ended March 31, 2012 as compared with the corresponding period of the previous year and also with the audited consolidated financial statements and MD&A contained in the Company's annual report for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011.

The Company's third quarter 2012 unaudited interim period condensed consolidated financial statements and the accompanying notes, will form part of the first annual audited consolidated financial statements to be prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS") for the year ending June 30, 2012. The changes are described under "Transition to IFRS" further in the report.

In this MD&A, references to the "Company" or to "Orbit Garant" shall mean, as the context may require, either Orbit Garant Drilling Inc., or Orbit Garant Drilling Inc. together with its wholly owned subsidiaries.

This MD&A is dated May 9, 2012. Disclosure contained in this document is current to that date unless otherwise stated.

Percentage calculations are based on numbers in the Financial Statements and may not correspond to rounded figures presented in this MD&A.

THIRD QUARTER FISCAL 2012 (Q3 FY2012) HIGHLIGHTS

- Record third quarter revenue of \$41.7 million, compared to \$33.4 million in the third quarter of fiscal 2011 (Q3 FY2011), an increase of 25.0%.
- Record third quarter meters drilled at 396,525, up 7.7% from 368,144 meters in Q3 FY2011.
- Gross margin increased to 23.9% for Q3 FY2012, from 20.4% for Q3 FY2011 as now presented under IFRS, which includes amortization expenses. Excluding amortization expenses, gross margin increased to 29.4%, from 25.7% in Q3 FY2011.
- EBITDA totalled \$8.3 million, up 37.9% from \$6.0 million in Q3 FY2011.
- Net earnings were \$3.5 million for Q3 FY2012, compared to \$2.3 million for Q3 FY2011.
- An expanded fleet of 226 drill rigs, including five drills added and one drill sold in Q3 FY2012.
- Capital expenditures of \$3.2 million to sustain growing business activity.

CORPORATE OVERVIEW

From its head office in Val-d'Or - Québec, Orbit Garant, with more than 1,100 employees, manages a fleet of 226 drilling rigs that provide surface and underground drilling services to the mining and exploration industry in Canada and internationally.

In the second quarter of fiscal year 2012, the Company acquired all the issued and outstanding shares of Lantech Drilling Services Inc. ("Lantech Drilling"), a company that specializes in exploration and geotechnical services to mining or mineral exploration companies, as well as, engineering and environmental consultant firms.

Orbit Garant has a cost efficient infrastructure and is vertically integrated with its manufacturing subsidiary, Soudure Royale, which manufactures essentially all its drilling rigs and thus provides the Company with an important competitive advantage. The Company also focuses on "specialized drilling", which refers to drilling projects that are in remote locations or, because of their scope and/or technical complexity, cannot be completed by small conventional drilling companies.

The Company has three operating segments: Drilling Canada (including domestic surface drilling and underground drilling), Drilling International, and Manufacturing Canada.

For the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012:

- Specialized drilling services, which typically generate a higher gross margin than conventional drilling services, accounted for approximately 60% of the Company's total revenue.
- The Company's surface and underground drilling services accounted for approximately 69% and 28%, respectively, of the Company's revenues. The manufacturing division accounted for the remaining 3% of revenue.
- Approximately 73% of the Company's revenues were generated by gold related operations, and approximately 27% were generated by base metal related and other operations.

- Approximately 84% of the Company's revenues were generated in Canada. The Company also operates in the USA, Mexico and Guyana in the Americas, and Liberia and Mauritania in West Africa. Approximately 97% of the Company's revenues were in Canadian dollars, which provides greater stability.
- Approximately 68% of Orbit Garant's customers were major and intermediate-sized mining companies, with which the Company had contracts of one to three years in length.

BUSINESS STRATEGY

Orbit Garant's goal is to be a leading Canadian-based mineral drilling company, while pursuing international opportunities, providing both underground and surface drilling for all stages of the mining and minerals business, including exploration, development and production. The Company employs the following business strategies:

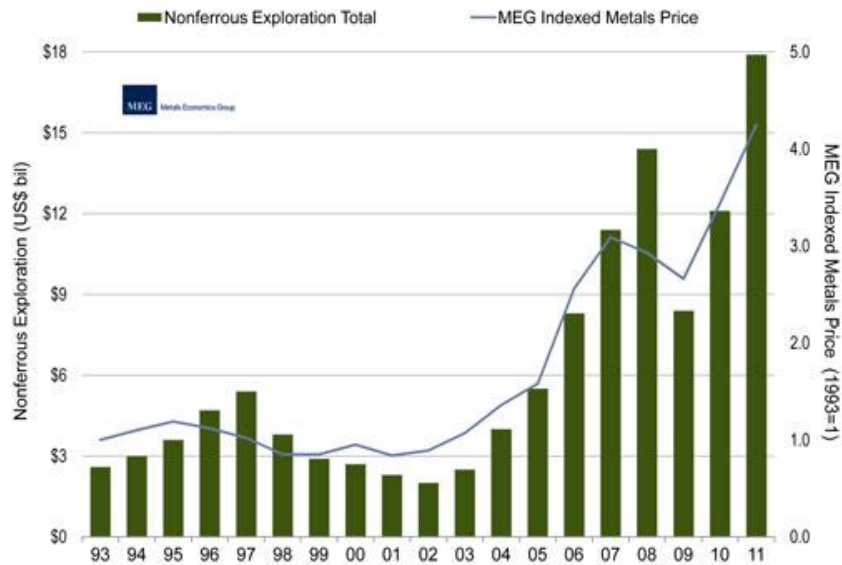
- Focus primarily on major and well financed intermediate mining and exploration companies operating in stable jurisdictions;
- Provide conventional, specialized and geotechnical drilling services;
- Manufacture drills and equipment to fit the needs of customers;
- Maintain a strong commitment to R&D and advanced drilling technologies;
- Provide training courses for the Company's personnel to continuously improve labour efficiency and the availability of a skilled labour force;
- Maintain a high level of safety standards in the work environment and promote protection of the environment;
- Establish and maintain long-term relationships with customers;
- Cross-sell drilling services to existing customers;
- Expand its bases of operations in strategic regions; and
- Evaluate strategic acquisition opportunities to enhance value for the Company's stakeholders.

INDUSTRY OVERVIEW

Demand for services in the mineral drilling industry is driven by conditions in the global ferrous (iron) and non-ferrous (precious and base metals) metals markets. The strength of demand is primarily determined by price levels for ferrous and non-ferrous metals and the availability of capital to finance exploration and development programs and/or ongoing mining operations. Despite current global economic uncertainties and market volatility, metals prices remain generally favourable. Gold prices are currently in excess of US\$1,500 an ounce, and base metal and iron ore prices are well above their collective five-year price lows which has created steady demand for mineral drilling services.

Metals Economics Group (MEG), a leading independent resource for global mining industry information and analysis, estimates that total global expenditures for non-ferrous metals exploration was a record US\$18.2 billion in 2011. MEG has forecasted 5% to 15% increase in exploration spending in 2012, compared to 2011.

Estimated Global Nonferrous Exploration Budgets and Indexed Metals Price*, 1993-2011**

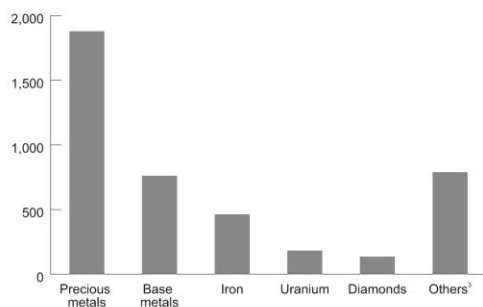

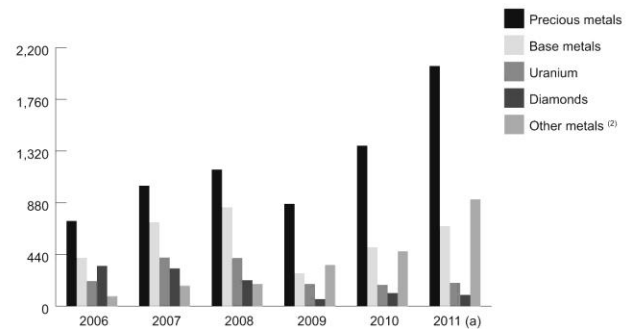
* The indexed metals price represents a blend of the relative changes in a basket of metals prices weighted by the percentage of exploration expenditures dedicated to each metal by the industry as reported in MEG's CES studies. This weighting acts as a proxy for the relative importance of each metal within the mining and exploration industry at a given time.

According to preliminary estimates from Natural Resources Canada (NRCan), mineral (ferrous and non-ferrous) exploration and development spending in Canada exceeded \$3.9 billion in 2011, surpassing prior record spending levels of 2008. NRCan is forecasting a new record of \$4.2 billion in ferrous and non-ferrous exploration spending in Canada in 2012. Ontario, Quebec, British Columbia, and Nunavut are expected to account for almost three-quarters of Canadian mineral exploration spending 2012.

Gold

With the current uncertainty concerning global economic conditions and financial markets, largely due to sovereign debt issues in Europe, uncertainty related to US deficit reduction, and broader concerns over the global economy, gold has once again emerged as a preferred safe haven for capital. Further, increasing affluence in rapidly developing countries, such as China and India, has created greater demand for luxury goods, including gold jewellery. These factors have contributed to the strong demand for gold and record prices of more than US\$1,900 an ounce as recently as September 2011, and current prices of more than US\$1,500 an ounce. This has resulted in robust cash flows for gold producers and greater access to capital for companies with highly prospective exploration and / or development properties.

Despite the substantial increase in the price of gold over the last decade, annual global gold production from 2002 to 2010 did not surpass the peak production levels attained in 2001, indicating that mine supply growth has been an industry challenge. With a lack of significant new discoveries and declining production at existing mines, many gold producers are focused on developing new projects or expanding existing deposits in efforts to replace or replenish reserves. In 2011, it is anticipated that global gold production exceeded the record production levels in 2001.

Base metals

Base metals' price performance generally reflects global economic conditions, as these metals are primarily used in infrastructure, industrial and manufacturing applications. Prices for aluminum, copper, lead, nickel and zinc – the primary industrial metals – were volatile throughout 2011 and this trend has continued in 2012. However, base metals remain well above their respective five-year price lows in late 2008 and early 2009, and well above average costs of production. Demand from emerging markets, particularly China and India, has a major influence on base metals markets.

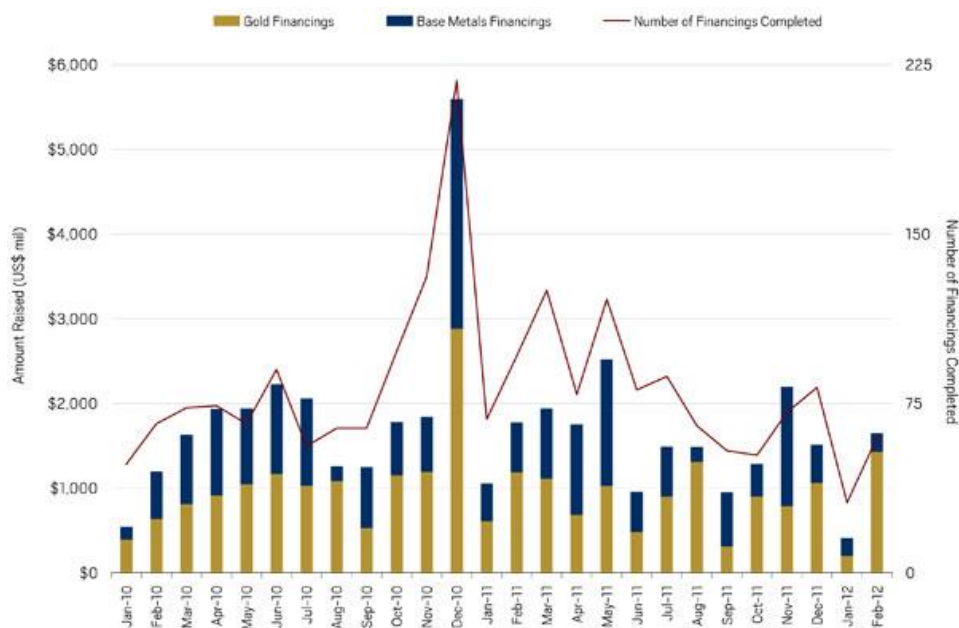
Iron ore

Iron ore prices are determined by the global demand for steel, as more than 95% of iron ore is used for steel making. Despite recent volatility, iron ore prices have increased significantly since 2005 – after remaining relatively flat over previous decades – reflecting increasing global demand, particularly from China, which is now the largest global consumer of iron ore.

Market participants

With higher metals prices since the market downturn in late 2008 and early 2009, the mining industry has remained relatively healthy. Many large companies, which have increased reserve levels in recent years only through upgrades at existing mines and/or M&A activity, have ramped up brownfield and greenfield exploration budgets, focusing on long-term market fundamentals. Intermediate and junior companies, which were conserving cash during the market downturn in 2009, increased their exploration spending in 2010 and 2011 as metals prices rebounded and access to capital improved. However, continued global economic uncertainty and metals price volatility is now making it more challenging for intermediates and juniors to raise capital.

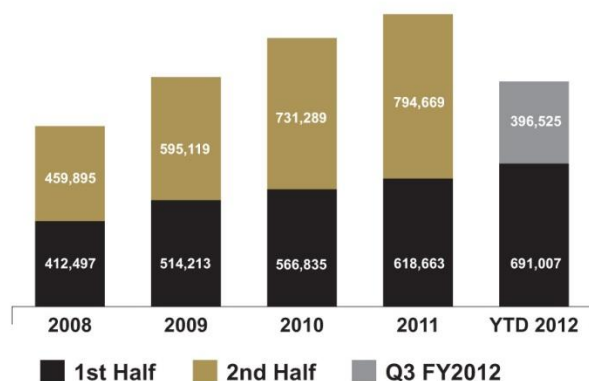

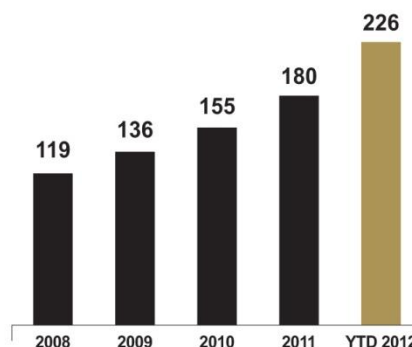

The Company continued to increase the number of meters drilled, reaching 396,525 meters in Q3 FY2012, an increase of 28,381 meters from 368,144 meters drilled in Q3 FY2011. The Company continued to expand its fleet with the addition of five new drill rigs from the manufacturing division and the disposal of one drill rig, bringing its drill rig count to 226 at the end of Q3 FY2012.

The Company's adjusted gross margin increased to 29.4% in Q3 FY2012, compared to 25.7% in Q3 FY2011.

Net earnings for Q3 FY2012 totalled \$3.5 million, or \$0.10 per common share (basic and diluted), compared to net earnings of \$2.3 million, or \$0.07 per common share (basic and diluted) in Q3 FY2011.

Since the second half of fiscal 2011, revenue per meter drilled has increased due to strong industry demand for drilling services and this trend continued in Q3 FY2012, as the Company's average revenue per meter drilled increased to \$101.68 in the quarter, up from \$87.94 in Q3 FY2011.

Contract revenue

During Q3 FY2012, the Company recorded contract revenues of \$41.7 million, an increase of \$8.3 million, or 25.0%, compared to the quarter ended March 31, 2011. Increased revenue resulted primarily from higher revenue per meter drilled and increased meters drilled, including a full quarter contribution from Lantech Drilling.

Domestic surface drilling revenue was \$22.7 million in Q3 FY2012, compared to \$15.3 million in Q3 FY2011, an increase of 48.7%. Most of the increase was attributable to price increases and drilling services from Lantech Drilling.

Underground drilling revenue stabilized at \$11.5 million in Q3 FY2012, in line with Q3 FY2011.

International drilling revenue was \$6.1 million in Q3 FY2012 compared to \$5.6 million in Q3 FY2011, an increase of 8.6%. The increase is primarily attributable to Lantech Drilling's West African activities.

Revenue from the manufacturing division was \$1.4 million in Q3 FY2012, compared to \$1.0 million for Q3 FY2011. Demand for new drills from third parties remains strong, but Orbit Garant continues to utilize capacity at Soudure Royale to manufacture drills and equipment for its own fleet.

Gross profit and margins (see Reconciliation of non-IFRS measures)

Gross profit for the third quarter of fiscal 2012 increased 46.7% to \$10.0 million from \$6.8 million in Q3 FY2011. Gross margin for Q3 FY2012 increased to 23.9% from 20.4% in the third quarter a year ago. In accordance with IFRS, amortization expenses totalling \$2.3 million are included in cost of contract revenue for Q3 FY2012, compared to \$1.8 million for Q3 FY2011. Adjusted gross margin, excluding amortization expenses, increased to 29.4% in Q3 FY2012, compared to adjusted gross margin of 25.7% in Q3 FY2011. Increased gross profit and gross margin in Q3 FY2012 reflects higher volumes of business and increased revenue per meter drilled.

General and administrative expenses

General and administrative (G&A) expenses increased to \$4.6 million (11.0% of revenue) in Q3 FY2012, from \$3.3 million (9.8% of revenue) in Q3 FY2011. Higher G&A expenses in Q3 FY2012 resulted primarily from increased personnel, the Company's new branch office in Sudbury, Ontario, the acquisition of Lantech Drilling, and the amortization expenses related to the Company's new head office in Val-d'Or, Quebec.

G&A expenses, excluding amortization of \$0.7 million, totalled \$3.9 million (9.4% of revenue) in Q3 FY2012, compared to \$2.7 million (8.2% of revenue) in Q3 FY2011.

EBITDA (see Reconciliation of non-IFRS measures)

EBITDA totalled \$8.3 million in the third quarter of fiscal 2012, compared to \$6.0 million in the same period a year ago, an increase of \$2.3 million, or 37.9%. EBITDA margin in Q3 FY2012 was 19.8%, compared to 17.9% in the corresponding period in fiscal 2011.

Financial expenses

Interest costs related to long-term debt and bank charges were \$0.4 million in Q3 FY2012, compared to \$0.2 million in Q3 FY2011.

Income taxes

Income taxes were \$1.5 million for Q3 FY2012 compared to \$1.2 million for the same period last year.

Net earnings

Net earnings for Q3 FY2012 were \$3.5 million, or \$0.10 per share (basic and diluted), compared to \$2.3 million, or \$0.07 per share (basic and diluted) for Q3 FY2011.

Revenues totalled \$111.3 million for the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, an increase of \$24.6 million, or 28.4%, from \$86.7 million during the comparable period last fiscal year.

Drilling Canada revenues were \$90.8 million for the first nine months of fiscal 2012, an increase of \$18.0 million, or 24.8%, compared to the same period in fiscal 2011. The increase was attributable to new contracts, price increases and the contribution of Lantech Drilling.

Drilling International revenues were \$17.1 million in the first nine months of 2012 compared to \$11.7 million in the comparable period a year ago, an increase of \$5.4 million, or 45.9%, reflecting increased demand for drilling services and the contribution from Lantech Drilling's activities in West Africa.

Manufacturing Canada revenues were \$3.4 million in the first nine months of 2012, an increase of \$1.2 million from the comparable period last fiscal year, resulting from increased demand for new drills.

Gross Profit and Margins (see Reconciliation of non-IFRS measures)

Gross profit for the first nine months of fiscal 2012 was \$26.0 million, an increase of \$7.6 million, or 41.5%, from \$18.3 million in the comparable period last fiscal year. Gross margin for the first nine months of fiscal 2012 was 23.3% compared to 21.2% for comparable period in fiscal 2011. Adjusted gross margin, excluding amortization expenses, increased to 29.1% for the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, compared to adjusted gross margin of 26.8% for the comparable period last fiscal year. Increased gross profit and gross margin is primarily attributable to price increases and higher overall business volumes, including increased international drilling activity, which is typically higher margin compared to domestic drilling projects.

General and Administrative Expenses

G&A expenses were \$12.0 million (10.8% of revenue) in the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, compared to \$8.2 million (9.4% of revenue) for the comparable period last fiscal year. Higher G&A expenses resulted primarily from increased personnel, the Company's acquisitions of Advantage Control Technologies and Morris Drilling Inc. in Q2 FY2011, the acquisition of Lantech Drilling in Q2 FY2012, and amortization expenses related to the Company's new head office in Val-d'Or, Quebec.

G&A expenses, excluding amortization expenses of \$2.0 million and \$0.2 million in professional fees related to the acquisition of Lantech Drilling, totalled \$9.8 million (8.8% of revenue) for the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, compared to \$6.9 million (7.9% of revenue) in the comparable period last fiscal year.

Financial Expenses

Interest costs related long-term debt and bank charges were \$1.0 million for the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, compared to \$0.4 million for the first nine months of fiscal 2011. Increased interest costs resulted from the Company's acquisition of Advantage Control Technologies and Morris Drilling Inc. in Q2 FY2011, and Lantech Drilling in Q2 FY2012.

Income Taxes

Income taxes were \$3.9 million in the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, compared to \$3.3 million for the comparable period in fiscal 2011.

Net Earnings

Net earnings in the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, were \$9.0 million or \$0.27 per share (\$0.26 per diluted share) compared with \$6.9 million or \$0.21 per share (\$0.20 per diluted share) during the comparable period last fiscal year. Increased net earnings resulted primarily from greater business activity and higher revenue per meter drilled.

EBITDA (see Reconciliation of non-IFRS measures)

EBITDA was \$22.3 million for the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, compared to \$16.7 million in the comparable period last fiscal year, an increase of \$5.6 million, or 33.9%. EBITDA in the nine-month period ended March 31, 2012, represented 20.1% of sales, compared to 19.2% of sales in the comparable period last fiscal year.

LIQUIDITY AND CAPITAL RESOURCES

Operating activities

Cash flow from operations, before non-cash operating working capital items, was \$8.5 million during Q3 FY2012, compared to \$6.2 million in Q3 FY2011.

The use of cash and non-cash working capital items is mainly due to an increase of inventories and accounts payable. These increases are attributable to increased drilling activities and the decision to replenish consumable products with larger orders to ensure sufficient supplies to meet operational requirements.

Investing activities

Cash used in investing activities totalled \$3.1 million for the third quarter of 2012, compared to \$5.9 million during Q3 FY2011. During Q3 FY2012, \$3.2 million was used for the acquisition of property, plant and equipment, partially offset by cash of \$0.1 million on disposition of property, plant and equipment. This compares with \$6.4 million for the acquisition of property, plant and equipment, partially offset by cash of \$0.5 million on disposition of an investment during Q3 FY2011.

Financing activities

Cash used in financing activities totalled \$0.7 million, resulting from proceeds from long-term debt of \$20.5 million less a \$21.2 million repayment of long-term debt during Q3 FY2012. During Q3 FY2011 cash flow from financing activities was \$3.0 million resulting from a bank loan of \$3.1 million.

As at March 31, 2012, the Company's working capital was \$61.0 million, compared to \$50.0 million as at June 30, 2011. The Company's working capital requirements are primarily to fund inventory acquisition and to support accounts receivable.

The Company believes that it will be able to generate sufficient cash flow to meet its current and future working capital expenditure and debt obligations. The Company's principal capital expenditures are for the acquisition of property, plant and equipment.

Source of Financing

The Company's primary sources of liquidity are from operations and borrowings under a credit agreement between the Company and National Bank of Canada Inc. (the "Credit Agreement") and also equity financing. On May 27, 2011, Orbit Garant obtained a new \$40.0 million secured, four-year revolving credit facility. Orbit Garant and its lenders have the option to increase the funds available under the new credit facility up to a total of \$60.0 million, subject to certain conditions. The new credit facility will be used to fund working capital requirements and provide further flexibility to the Company's long-term acquisition program. This facility matures no later than May 27, 2015. As of March 31, 2012 the Company has used \$29.3 million.

The Credit Agreement contains covenants that limit the Company's ability to undertake certain actions, including mergers, liquidations, dissolutions and changes of ownership; the incurrence of additional indebtedness; encumbering the Company's assets; guarantees, loans, investments and acquisitions that may be made by the Company; investing in or entering into derivative instruments, paying dividends and/or making other capital distributions to related parties; making capital expenditures; and making certain asset sales.

SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of presentation and adoption of IFRS

The interim condensed consolidated financial statements reflect the first-time adoption of International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"), which replaced Canadian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles ("GAAP") as of January 1, 2011. The cost of sales and administrative expenses now include amortization expenses. All disclosures and explanations related to the first-time adoption of IFRS are presented in note 19, which provides information that is considered material to the understanding of the Company's first IFRS financial statements. It also presents a reconciliation of the 2010 financial figures prepared under Canadian GAAP to the 2010 financial figures prepared under IFRS, including a reconciliation of the consolidated statements of earnings, comprehensive earnings and cash flows for the three-month period ended March 31, 2011 and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011, as well as a reconciliation of the consolidated balance sheets and equity as of July 1, 2010, March 31, 2011 and as of June 30, 2011.

The IFRS interim condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared based on the following accounting policies:

The interim condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared with IFRS as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board ("IASB"). In particular, they were prepared in accordance with IAS 34, Interim Financial Reporting, and with IFRS 1, First-time Adoption of IFRS. These interim condensed consolidated

financial statements should be read in conjunction with the 2011 annual consolidated financial statements and in consideration of the IFRS transition disclosures included in note 19.

The interim condensed consolidated financial statements were approved for issue by the Board of Directors of Orbit Garant Drilling Inc. on May 9, 2012.

The interim condensed consolidated financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis, except for the contingent liability, which has been measured at fair value. These interim condensed consolidated financial statements have been presented in Canadian dollars which is the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Company and its subsidiaries operate ("functional currency").

CHANGES TO ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Transition to IFRS

The interim condensed consolidated financial statements are prepared in accordance with IFRS, as described under accounting policies (note 3). The date of the opening balance sheet under IFRS and the Company's date of transition to IFRS is July 1, 2010. IFRS 1 requires the presentation of Comparative Financial Information and imposes to the First-time adopters to apply retrospectively all the IFRS standards in effect for the Company, for the period ended June 30, 2012. It provides certain optional exemptions and certain mandatory exceptions for the First-time IFRS adopters.

Prior to the adoption of IFRS, for all periods up to and including the year ended June 30, 2010, the Company's consolidated financial statements were prepared in accordance with Canadian GAAP. The Company applied IFRS 1 First-time Adoption of IFRS to prepare its first interim condensed consolidated financial statements. The transition impact to IFRS on equity, net earnings, comprehensive earnings and cash flows is presented and described in note 19 of the interim condensed consolidated financial statements

Initial choices on adoption

The Company has applied IFRS 1 in preparing these interim condensed consolidated financial statements. The Company is required to establish IFRS accounting policies as of the transition date and, in general, to apply these retrospectively to determine the IFRS opening balance sheet at July 1, 2010. This Standard provides a number of mandatory exceptions and optional exemptions to this general principle of retrospective application for the translation of Canadian GAAP to IFRS for the Company. Descriptions of applicable exemptions and exceptions are set out below, together with the Company's elections:

Mandatory exceptions

Estimates - In accordance with IFRS 1, an entity's estimates under IFRS as of the transition date to IFRS must be consistent with estimates made for the same date under previous Canadian GAAP, unless there is objective evidence that those estimates were in error. The estimates previously made by the Company under Canadian GAAP were not revised on the application of IFRS.

Optional choices applied by the Company

Business Combinations - IFRS 1 provides the option to apply IFRS 3R (revised), Business Combinations, retrospectively or prospectively from the transition date. A retrospective basis would require restatement of all business combinations that occurred prior to the transition date. The Company has elected not to apply IFRS 3R retrospectively to business combinations that occurred before the date of transition. These business combinations were not restated. Accordingly, IAS 27 Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements, is also applied prospectively. Any goodwill arising on acquisition differences has not been adjusted from the carrying value previously determined under Canadian GAAP as a result of applying this exemption.

Cumulative translation adjustment - IFRS permits cumulative translation gains and losses related to net investments in foreign operations to be reset to zero as of the date of transition, rather than applying IAS 21, The Effect of Changes in Foreign Exchange Rates, retrospectively from the date a subsidiary was formed or acquired. The Company elected to reset all cumulative translation adjustments to zero in its opening retained earnings as of July 1, 2010.

Reconciliation of Canadian GAAP to IFRS

IFRS 1 requires an entity to reconcile equity, comprehensive income and cash flows for prior periods. The Company's first time adoption of IFRS did not have an impact on the total operating, investing or financing cash flows. The following represents the reconciliations from Canadian GAAP to IFRS in respect to the equity, earnings and comprehensive earnings.

Changes in accounting policies

In addition to the exemptions and exceptions discussed above, the following narratives explain the significant differences between the previous Canadian GAAP accounting policies and the current IFRS policies applied by the Company.

Share-based compensation

Under IFRS, the liability related to share-based awards that call for settlement in cash or other assets must be measured at its fair value and is to be re-measured at its fair value at the end of each reporting period. Under Canadian GAAP, the liability was measured and re-measured at each reporting date at the intrinsic values of the stock-based awards instead of at their fair values.

Under IFRS, when a share-based payment vests in instalments over a vesting period (“graded vesting”), each instalment is accounted for as a separate arrangement as compared to Canadian GAAP, which gave the choice of treating the instruments as a pool, with the measurement being determined using the average life of the awards granted.

Translation gains or losses related to net investments in foreign operations

As stated above in section “IFRS 1 exemptions and exceptions,” the Company elected to reset all cumulative translation gains and losses related to investments in foreign operations to zero in opening retained earnings as at the transition date.

(a) Stock-based compensation

Canadian GAAP - For grants of share-based awards with graded vesting, the total fair value of the award is recognized on a straight-line basis over the employment period necessary to vest the award.

IFRS - Each tranche in an award with graded vesting is considered a separate grant with a different vesting date and fair value. Each grant is accounted for on that basis. As a result, the Company adjusted its expense for share-based awards to reflect this difference in recognition for all stock options granted.

(b) Business combinations - Contingent consideration

Canadian GAAP - Contingent consideration was recognized as part of the purchase price when they were paid.

IFRS - Contingent consideration is recognized at fair value at the date of the acquisition date. The Company has booked a contingent consideration related to the acquisition of 1085820 Ontario Limited (Advantage Control Technologies).

(c) Business combination - Acquisition costs

Canadian GAAP - The acquisition costs were accounted for as part of the purchase price.

IFRS - The acquisition costs are accounted for as expense in the statement of earnings. The Company accounted for in the statement of earnings the acquisition costs related to the acquisitions of 1085820 Ontario Limited (Advantage Control Technologies) and Morris Drilling Inc.

(d) Statement of earnings reclassification

Canadian GAAP- The income statement should present fairly the results of operation for the period and should provide some specific information, however the concept of the classification either by nature or by function is not addressed.

IFRS – An entity shall present an analysis of expenses recognized in profit and loss using a classification based on either their nature or their function within the entity, whichever provides information that is reliable and more relevant. The Company believes that the classification of its expenses by function is more relevant.

As a result, the amortization has been reclassified between cost of contract revenue and general and administrative expenses. Also, interest on long-term debt, interest and bank charges, foreign exchange losses and gain on disposal of property plant and equipment, has been reclassified in their respective function.

RECENT ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

The Company has not early adopted the following new standards and adoption impacts on the consolidated financial statements have not yet been determined:

IFRS 9 – Financial instruments

IFRS 9 simplifies the measurement and classification for financial assets by reducing the number of measurement categories and removing complex rule-driven embedded derivative guidance in IAS 39, Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement. The new standard also provides for a fair value option in the designation of a non-derivative financial liability and its related classification and measurement. IFRS 9 is effective from periods beginning January 1, 2013 with early adoption permitted.

IFRS 10 – Consolidated Financial Statements

IFRS 10 replaces SIC-12 Consolidation – Special Purpose Entities and parts of IAS 27 Consolidated and Separate Financial Statements and provides additional guidance regarding the concept of control as the determining factor in whether an entity should be included within the consolidated financial statements of the parent company. IFRS 10 is effective from periods beginning January 1, 2013 with early adoption permitted.

IFRS 11 – Joint Arrangements

IFRS 11 replaces IAS 31, Interests in Joint Ventures, with guidance that focuses on the rights and obligations of the arrangement, rather than its legal form. It also withdraws the option to proportionately consolidate an entity's interests in joint ventures. The new standard requires that such interests be recognized using the equity method. IFRS 11 is effective from periods beginning January 1, 2013 with early adoption permitted.

IFRS 12 – Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities

IFRS 12 is a new and comprehensive standard on disclosure requirements for all forms of interests in other entities, including joint arrangements, associates, special purpose entities and other off balance sheet vehicles. IFRS 12 is effective from periods beginning January 1, 2013 with early adoption permitted.

IFRS 13 – Fair value measurements

IFRS 13 defines the fair value and demands the disclosure of the estimates at fair value and provides guidance on measuring fair value when required or permitted to do so according to the IFRS standards. IFRS 13 is effective from periods beginning January 1, 2013 with early adoption permitted.

RECONCILIATION OF NON - IFRS FINANCIAL MEASURES

Financial data has been prepared in conformity with IFRS. However, certain measures used in this discussion and analysis do not have any standardized meaning under IFRS and could be calculated differently by other companies. The Company believes that certain non-IFRS financial measures, when presented in conjunction with comparable IFRS financial measures, are useful to investors and other readers because the information is an appropriate measure for evaluating the Company's operating performance. Internally, the Company uses this non-IFRS financial

information as an indicator of business performance. These measures are provided for information purposes, in addition to, and not as a substitute for, measures of financial performance prepared in accordance with IFRS.

EBITDA

Profit for the period before finance income and costs, income tax expenses and amortization.

Adjusted gross margin

Contract revenue less operating cost. Operating expenses comprise material and service expenses, personnel expenses, other operating expenses, excluding amortization.

CRITICAL ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES, ASSUMPTIONS AND JUDGEMENTS

Estimates, assumptions and judgments are evaluated continuously by the Company and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

The Company makes estimates, assumptions and judgments concerning the future. Actual results could differ from these estimates. The estimates, assumptions and judgments that have a risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities with the next financial year, are presented in note 4 of the financial statement.

RISK FACTORS

The following are certain factors relating to the Company's business and the industry within which it operates. The following information is a summary only of certain risk factors and is qualified in its entirety by reference to, and must be read in conjunction with, the detailed information appearing elsewhere in this report and in the Company's Annual Information Form dated September 21, 2011. These risks and uncertainties are not the only ones relevant to the Company. Additional risks and uncertainties not currently known to the Company, or that the Company currently deems immaterial, may also impair the operations of the Company. If any such risks actually occur, the business, financial condition, liquidity and results of operations of the Company could be materially, adversely affected.

Risk Related to Structure and Common Shares

Equity Market Risks

There is a risk associated with any investment in shares. The market price of securities such as the Common Shares of the Company are affected by numerous factors, including, but not limited to, general market conditions, actual or anticipated fluctuations in the Company's results of operations, changes in estimates of future results of operations by the Company or securities analysts, risks identified in this section and other factors. In addition, the financial markets have experienced significant price and volume fluctuations that have sometimes been unrelated to the operating performance of the issuers or the industries in which they operate. Consequently, the trading price of the Common Shares may fluctuate.

Influence of Existing Shareholders

As of May 9, 2012, Pierre Alexandre, the Vice-Chairman of the Company, holds or controls, directly or indirectly, approximately 28% of Orbit Garant's outstanding Common Shares. As a result, this shareholder has the ability to influence Orbit Garant's strategic direction and policies, including any merger, consolidation or sale of all or substantially all of its assets, and the election and composition of Orbit Garant's Board of Directors. The foregoing ability to affect the control and direction of Orbit Garant could reduce its attractiveness as a target for potential takeover bids and business combinations, and correspondingly affect its share price.

Future Sales of Common Shares by the Company's Existing Shareholders

Certain shareholders, including Pierre Alexandre, hold or control significant blocks of shares of the Company. The decision of any of these shareholders to sell a substantial number of Common Shares in the public market could result in a material imbalance in demand for the Company's shares and therefore a decline in the market price of the Common Shares. In addition, the perception among the public that such sales may occur could also result in a reduction in the market price of the Common Shares.

Dilution

Orbit Garant may raise additional funds in the future by issuing equity securities. Holders of Common Shares will have no pre-emptive rights in connection with such further issuances. Additional Common Shares may be issued by Orbit Garant, in connection with the exercise of options granted. Such additional equity issuances could, depending on the price at which such securities are issued, substantially dilute the interests of the holders of Common Shares.

OUTLOOK

Demand for Orbit Garant's drilling services remains strong. Management believes the mining industry outlook remains generally positive, particularly the mineral exploration industry in Canada, where approximately 84% of Orbit Garant's revenue is currently derived. Increasing demand for minerals from developing countries, such as Brazil, Russia, India and China, are providing the largest impetus for growth. China has a significant impact on global ferrous and nonferrous metals demand and prices. The relative lack of new mineral discoveries, shortage of labour and other supply issues affecting traditional markets are all contributing to constraints in supply.

With gold prices currently near an historic high per ounce and base metals and iron ore prices well above the five-year price lows experienced in late 2008 and early 2009, mining companies are able to economically exploit a greater number of mineral deposits. Senior mining companies generally have healthy balance sheets, which will allow the necessary investments to continue production and exploration programs. However, continued global economic uncertainty is now making it difficult for junior exploration companies to access capital.

Orbit Garant expects utilization rates for drilling service companies to remain high for the remainder of 2012, which in turn will support stable pricing. With the current demand for drilling services and a stable pricing environment, Management expects the Company's margins in the fourth quarter of fiscal 2012 to be consistent with levels achieved in the third quarter of fiscal 2012.

Technology improvements, a focus of the Company's acquisition of Advantage Control Technologies, will be an important contributor to future profitability. Orbit Garant manufactured 16 new drill rigs for its fleet in the first nine months of fiscal 2012, of which one drill rig features the new computerized monitoring and control technology, acquired with Advantage Control Technologies. The Company expects to manufacture five additional drill rigs featuring its computerized monitoring and control technology in the fourth quarter of fiscal 2012.

The Company's recent acquisition of Lantech Drilling established a new strategic hub for Orbit Garant in Eastern Canada, added 32 drill rigs and expertise in iron ore drilling and geotechnical services, and strengthened Orbit Garant's team with highly skilled management personnel, drillers and field technicians. Lantech Drilling also provides Orbit Garant with a strategic entry point to the higher margin mineral drilling market in West Africa. Management plans to leverage the combined operations of Orbit Garant and Lantech Drilling to pursue new business development opportunities both in Canada and internationally.

With its strong balance sheet, leading position in Quebec, growing presence in Ontario and through the Company's recently expanded operations in New Brunswick and West Africa, Management believes Orbit Garant is well positioned for future growth. As the mining industry grows, and attracts new spending, Orbit Garant intends to build on its organic growth by focusing on acquisition opportunities that further enhance stakeholder value.

INTERNAL CONTROLS OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING

The Company's Chief Executive Officer ("CEO") and the Chief Financial Officer ("CFO") are responsible for designing internal controls over financial reporting ("ICFR") or causing them to be designed under their supervision. The Company's ICFR are designed to provide reasonable assurance regarding the reliability of the Company's financial reporting and its preparation of financial statements for external purposes in accordance with IFRS.

As discussed above, the inherent limitations in all control systems are such that they can provide only reasonable, not absolute, assurance that all control issues and instances of fraud or error, if any, within the Company, have been detected. Therefore, no matter how well designed, ICFR have inherent limitations and can provide only reasonable assurance with respect to financial statement preparation and may not prevent and detect all misstatements.

For the nine months ended March 31, 2012, there have been no significant changes to the ICFR and no change in the assessment of the effectiveness of the Company's ICFR. Accordingly, the CEO and CFO have concluded that the design and operation were effective at a reasonable assurance level as of the end of the period covered by this report.
